



BACKGROUND & OBJECTIVE

- Access to health facilities impacted by continuous increase in conflict
- Deployment of mobile clinics (MC) and Rapid Response Mechanisms (RRM) by a range of partners
- Level of integration of nutrition interventions varies by country and by organization supporting the implementation of the MC/RRM



Need for harmonization of a minimum package of nutrition interventions to be systematically integrated in these delivery modalities to ensure access to essential health and nutrition services in all contexts



Treatment of uncomplicated SAM cases using the standard (national) protocol	
Moderate acute malnutrition (MAM) supplementation

STEP 2: REGIONAL CONSULTATION

Main challenges identified during consultation	Proposed recommendations		
Financing gaps	 MC modality as a mechanism to strengthen the resilience of the health system to adapt to shocks. Not only humanitarian financing but also to be considered for funding that supports resilience and health system strengthening. 		
Concerns around sustainability	Strengthened Government ownership, integration in the health system, integration in national protocols/guidance documents (with definition of conditions for activation and duration).		
Gaps in coordination, supply chain management and lack of harmonization in implementation	 Strengthen the collaboration between health and nutrition clusters. Strengthen the collaboration between Government stakeholders and partners. Define package of intervention and conditionalities for implementation (including supply chain arrangements) within national guidance documents. 		
Limited human resource capacity for MC/RRM	 Plan for human resources and include costs in budget needs. Adapt package of interventions according to the HR composition. 		
Gaps in data collection and integration in the national health information system	SOPs for collecting and reporting health and nutrition data must be set up in the MC/RRM in accordance with the mechanism established by the country's health information system






Evidence and Gap Map (EGM)

Intervention Evidence on Mental Health-Food Security and Nutrition Synergies

Uganda interpersonal therapy trial

- Control: care groups focusing on nutrition, WASH and child care messages
- Initial differences in depression between IPT-G arms lessened over time

Tanzania agro-ecological program trial

- Intervention over three years had direct effects on improving mental health
- Part of the effect was explained by changes in food security
- Other pathways?

Bangladesh homestead food production trial

- Intervention over four years had direct effects on improving mental health
- Part of the effect was explained by changes in food security and dietary diversity (mostly food systems)
- Other pathways?

Interpretation of Emerging Evidence

- The empirical links between food security or nutrition and mental health have largely been observed as an afterthought or by-product of other work.
- We have some evidence that nutrition sensitive programs can improve mental health, even when they contain no MH components.
- Some of the positive effect on mental health is attributable to food security improvements, but what else contributes?
- What if we actually learned more about this and planned programs and policies with these synergies in mind?



Background

Problem

No agreed, evidence-based operational package of measures for the prevention of undernutrition being implemented in food insecure/humanitarian settings

Purpose

To contribute to solutions to recurring food insecurity and nutrition crises through the consultative development of improved guidance and testing of multi-sectoral preventive approaches designed to address undernutrition and food insecurity in humanitarian settings.

Model of Prevention



The Evidence Review

- Summarises the evidence base for interventions that could help to prevent undernutrition among children under-5, adolescent girls and pregnant and breastfeeding women (PBWGs) in humanitarian/ food insecure contexts.
- Growing body of evidence in nearly all intervention areas investigated, and high-quality evidence in some areas.
- A lot of the evidence comes from studies implemented outside acute humanitarian contexts
- Whilst some areas lack strong evidence for prevention, guidance should build on what we know to be important causal pathways to undernutrition








Global greenhouse gas emissions from food production

Climate adaptation

"the process of adjustment to actual or expected climate and its effects, in order to moderate harm or exploit beneficial opportunities" (IPCC AR6)

Climate mitigation

"A human intervention to reduce emissions or enhance the sinks of greenhouse gasses"
(IPCC AR6)



THE CLIMATE CRISIS IS PUTTING NUTRITION AT RISK, AND NEGATIVE IMPACTS ARE NOT EQUITABLY DISTRIBUTED

Negative impacts of climate shocks and stresses on:

- Wasting

- Underweight
- Low birthweight
- Emerging evidence on overweight and obesity

Differential impact related to:

- Geography
- Level of contribution to climate change,



SO WHAT DOES THIS MEAN FOR US?

- Climate change is a main driver of food insecurity and malnutrition, and complex emergencies
- 2 Ever increasing and more intense climate shocks, increasing humanitarian needs and costly responses

- Exposures to excessive rainfall, extreme temperatures, floods and droughts are among the risk factors for wasting and stunting
- Underscores the need to continue shifting from a reactive to a more forward-looking humanitarian system



GNC CLIMATE CRISIS WORKING GROUP

- 1. Raise awareness on nutrition and the climate crisis
- 2. Stimulate technical consultation
- 3. Coordinate actions to address gaps in guidance, partnerships and actions

NUTRITION AND THE CLIMATE CRISIS SURVEY

In an effort to solicit the opinions of nutrition practitioners, and ultimately in creating a dialogue space to discuss the relationship between nutrition programming and the climate crisis in both emergency and development contexts, the Climate Change Workstream launched a survey on nutrition and the climate crisis. The survey was shared through EN-NET and the GNC Newsletter. There were 37 respondents. Of those who reported their location: Africa (24), Europe (6), North America (3), Middle East (2), Asia (1), Thity-six inclicated that they would be interested in participating in a climate change dialogue space. This is a glimpse at some of the most compelling responses.

What role do you think the nutrition sector can play in helping to tackle the climate crisis?

"providing evidence on effects of climate crisis on nutrition"

"Gathering evidence - documenting effects of climate crisis on people's lives, contributing to making the community voice heard, increase advocacy efforts among key decision-makers"

"Nutrition binds together advocacy efforts to increase clean water, land rights, environmental justice and resillent power generation. The nutrition sector needs to work together to push for small scale and high scale systematic integration. It cannot stand alone, we must collaborate with the nutrient and changing cultural demands of people (especially marginalized communities), work with government leaders to carry through nutrition AND sustainable agriculture implementation and create a response that takes into consideration the types of crops that need to be prioritized for equitable nutrition and food distribution while decentralizing food systems."

"Advocating [for] optimal child and maternal feeding to create responsible generation, invest in climate change risk reduction, promote environment friendly nutritious food production"

"Increase local production of RUTF and RUSF to decrease carbon footprint and provide economic opportunities in affected areas, which may improve HH food security"

"Finding sustainable solutions for healthy diets; decreasing the south dependance from western countries in terms of treatments (i.e. imported RUTF, RUSF), drugs, and food."

"Embark on food processing to avoid food waste."

"By encouraging the consumption of more sustainable plant-based foods in comparison to foods especially of animal origin that have higher climate cost."

"Promote homestead gardening, reducing waste from food, promote use of organic manure"

"By educating the communities to reverse climate change by planting trees and edible trees that provide nutrients like fruit trees, crop diversification, using conservation agriculture, going back to indigenous food crops, kitchen gardens, promoting subsistence agriculture etc."

What do you think of when you think of nutrition and the climate crisis?



What changes do you think are needed to help tackle the climate crisis?

"Avoid activities that increase global warming, pollution, use of green energy, food fortification"

"solid government investment in clean energy backed by radical policies to reduce carbon emissions. incentives for developing countries to reduce emissions, the sector: less in person conferences, flights"

"The nutrition sector must do more than pay lip service to breastfeeding but must actually make it happen."

"Afforestation, diversity in crops planted, water harvesting techniques"

"1 Regenerate lost forest 2 Oblige industry to plan, monitor themselves destroyed forest 3 Develop industry based on forest regeneration."

"Reduce unnecessary packaging of supplies (especially plastics), shift to more carbon friendly transportation whenever possible, improve farming practices"

"Local actors with the support of INGOs and UN can reduce climate change and do resilience"

"Investing more efforts and resources in really building local capacities; investing in sustainable local solutions"

"Governments & UN: continue advocating for global efforts in reducing emissions & other known causes of climate change."

"There is a lot of talk about climate crisis but the power of money prevails and certain key decisions are not being taken or not being taken seriously. I think a change needs to start there. We all have a personal responsibility in this but it seems that a lot is a play of words - different declarations but [the] biggest pollutors are still allowed to operate."



1. EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS AND RESPONSE WITH A CLIMATE LENS

- Expanding nutrition risk analyses to incorporate climate risks and vulnerabilities to support humanitarian and development planning
- Investing in nutrition
 in emergencies systems, processes and capacities
 to generate analyses
- Using a climate lens through the humanitarian program cycle
- Advocating jointly with development actors to raise the profile of the climate crisis and its impacts in that context to guide further government action





2. CLIMATE-ADAPTED NUTRITION IN EMERGENCIES ACTION

Climate-adapted delivery of nutrition services, for example:

- Approaches to support healthy diets and care pathways
- Strengthening nutrition in outbreak and public health emergencies response guidance and processes
- Strengthening nutrition responses for people on the move

Exploring climate-adaptive social protection

Advocacy with other sectors for climate-adapted infrastructure





Climate & Nutrition

About the Group: Aims to raise awareness, stimulate technical collaboration and develop guidance on the climate crisis and nutrition nexus for GNC partners and the wider humanitarian

Key Activities:

- . Online survey to understand GNC partners' views of the climate crisis and their interest in dialogue spaces.
- . Working on: organizing a series of thematic webinars or coffee chats involving subject matter experts; mapping existing climate related projects/initiatives and ongoing climate and nutrition work with academia and research institutes with the support of a consultant for the GNC.

Disability Inclusion

About the Group: Aims to identify gaps in inclusion of disability in nutrition interventions, develop tools and resources to address gaps and be a disability inclusion champion within and outside of the GNC.

Key Activities

- . Conducting an annual review of disability inclusion in HNO/HRP nutrition chapters, to identify good practice
- Produced a tip sheet for strengthening disability inclusion in HNOs/HRPs
- . Created a webpage with key resources on disability inclusion and nutrition
- Produced FAOs on disability and nutrition


